

# Reading Comprehension & Discussion Guide

### **Comprehension Questions**

- 1. There are lots of fun tents at "Early Bird Summer Camp." If you were there, which tent would you most like to visit and why?
- 2. What does a flamingo look like? Try to describe it without looking at the pictures!
- 3. Where does Miss Sapphire live?
- 4. Why did Sophie really want to find Miss Sapphire?
- 5. At the start of the story, did Sophie like the way her life was? What clues in the story tell you this?
- 6. Name some things Sophie didn't like about herself or her life.
- 7. When Sophie finally became a flamingo, was her life as wonderful as she thought it would be? Why or why not?
- 8. What was something Sophie thought she would love as a flamingo that turned out to be not so great after all?





### **Discussion Questions**

- 9. In the end, Sophie realized her life as a sparrow was actually pretty great! What things made Sophie's life good just the way it was?
- 10. Have you ever wished you were different or had something someone else has? How did that feel?
- 11. Sophie learned that being herself was better than being someone else. Can you think of something special about YOU that makes you, well... you?
- 12. What do you think the story is trying to teach us about being happy?

## **Art & Gratitude Activity**

Think about the things in YOUR life that make you happy—the people you love, things you enjoy doing, places you like to go, or even your favorite foods!

Draw a picture showing the things you're most grateful for in your life.

#### You can include:

- People who make you smile
- Activities you love
- Places that feel special to you
- Things that make your life good just the way it is

#### **Bonus Question for Curious Minds!**

What is the wingspan of an American Bald Eagle? (Hint: It's pretty impressive!)
